Tudor Church Militant Edward VI

German Catholic monk who initiated the Protestant Reformation; emphasized the primacy of faith in place of Catholic sacraments for gaining salvation; rejected papal authority. Doctrine of Faith and Justification & 95 Thesis, posted in 1517, led to religious reform in Germany, denied papal power and absolutist rule.
